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EIGHT YEARS AGO the first News Letter made its appearance. A total of fifty issues have been prepared and mailed from then until now. World War II got in the way of and then stopped the Letter altogether. Now, at the request of those gathered at Upper Sandusky in the Fourth National Reunion, we begin a new series with the promise of issues as material is made available. We begin this first issue with the minutes of the Fourth National Reunion business meeting as given to us by past-president F A Lightey who with his good wife made of that Reunion such a success. We acknowledge a most pleasant visit from Mr and Mrs Lightey during which time we discussed many things having to do with the News Letter and with the organization that sponsors it. We will discuss these matters from time to time.

THE FOURTH NATIONAL SHAMBAUGH REUNION was held at Wyandot County Fair Grounds. The president, F A Lightey, was in charge. The place decided for the next Reunion was with the Loudenville group at Ashland Brookside Park. It was voted on to hold the National Reunion on the Sunday proceeding Labor Day. Sam Shambaugh of Ashland was elected president of the National Reunion. Floyd Shambaugh was elected vice-president with Mrs Guy Portner elected to the position of secretary-treasurer. It was suggested that we let the News Letter know about deaths in the family. It was suggested that we put the names of our father or mother of the Shambaugh line on the register. A committee was elected to edit and compile the monthly News Letter. Harry Gleim was selected as editor with Mrs Harry Gervin and Mrs Lois Castleberry as co-editors. Mrs Harry Gervin was appointed to receive subscriptions for the News Letter and to forward same to Mr. Gleim. The rate was set at \$1.00 per year. The National secretary read the minutes of the Third National Reunion and they were approved. H F Garthrie and Mrs Lois Castleberry were both unable to attend because of illness. Regrets were received from Mr and Mrs Harry Gleim, Hardy, Nebr., Mrs R H Dick of Chester, Pa., Miss Junia Shambaugh of Washington, D C., Mrs Arthur L Shambaugh of Republic, Ohio and Wm C Trachscl of Akron Ohio, besides many others. A collection of \$20.15 was taken which was \$8.00 more than necessary to pay expenses. This balance was forwarded to the News Letter. There were about 160 people present. Another Reunion was a success.

DURING THE MONTH OF DECEMBER we sent out a letter to 100 members of the Shambaugh clan asking for items and news. There were eight responses. Unless we do better than this it is going to be difficult to make a monthly letter, even if we do plan to continue our series on Family History as a part of the letter.

Rev. Wm F Switzer, 732 Harrison, Gary, Indiana expresses his pleasure at the renewal of the News Letter and writes- " I have personally known seven who were born Shambaughs and not one of them ' thought of himself more highly than he ought to think', but obeyed the Scriptures. They were all endowed with good common sense and were good citizens. I think Adam Shambaugh was one of the most gifted men I ever knew. He was a preacher, an editor, a doctor, a carpenter, a cabinet maker and a printer. He loved the United Brethren Church and gave of his means and talents to its promotion. My father said that he never saw Adam make an unprofitable stroke with an axe. He was sure that he was right and went ahead." Rev. Switzer was 91 years old on January 21. He is undoubtedly our oldest living member of the clan.

Mrs Teresa Boyd, 745 So. 6th St., Coshocton, Ohio says she is thankful that she has not been forgotten and that the News Letters are on again.- " I can not write very much, I am so nervous and my eyes are in such bad shape."
