THE PASSING OF AN OLD PIONEER. Isaiah Jacob Showalter, born Jan. 1, 1847 at Greencastle, Indiana, son of Nimrod and Sarah Ann (Shambaugh) Showalter, passed away, February 3, 1940 at his home at Stuttgart, Ark. aged 93 years 1 mo and 2 da His early education was received at Greencastle and at the age of 20 years he came to Ringgold County, Iowa to teach school. In 1869 he was married to Martha Agnes Miller and to his union six children were born five of whom survived his death. In 1904 he moved to Stuttgart where Mrs Miller passed away in 1915. Two years later he married Mary Starnes who also preceded him in death. Surviving him are two sons, H F Showalter of Glendale, Calif and Ernest W. Showalter of Brush, Colo; three daughters, Mrs Ernest Ewing of El Reno, Okla., Mrs W P Marshall of Des Arc, Ark and Mrs F M Glenn of Stuttgart, five grandchildren and three great grandchildren. One son, Lester Erle died in 1902 at Grant City, Mo. He was almost a life long member of the Advent Christian Church.

A PROMINENT EDUCATOR PASSES. April 7, 1940 marked the passing of Prof. Benj. F. Shambaugh of Iowa City, Iowa head of the Political Science Department and leading Iowa historian. He was in his 69th year, being born at Elvira, Iowa January 29, 1871, the son of John and Eva (Ressler) Shambaugh. He was graduated from the University of Iowa in 1892, obtaining from the institution the degrees of Bachelor of Philosophy and Master of Arts, later, at the University of Pennsylvania he received a degree of Doctor of Philosophy. Study abroad took him to the University of Halle, Lipsig and Berlin. Beginning his life work in the capacity of instructor in government in a back room of the old Iowa State House in Iowa City, Professor Shambaugh developed the present large department from an institution of one instructor, sixty-nine students and three courses. The department of political science at Iowa State University through his efforts has become recognized as one of the leaders of its kind in the United States. He served as research worker, curator and superintendent and editor of the State Historical Society of Iowa. In the American History Association and the American Political Science Association he held many official posts. Writers generally credit him with either having written or having edited a major share of Iowa's historical literature. Working with Mrs Shambaugh, the former Bertha Morack, a fellow zealot in historical research the political scientist has collected a mass of Iowa pioneer data that otherwise might have been lost. The following passages from some of his writings and speeches give an insight into his general philosophy. Of universities he wanted, " Fewer big stadiums and more little theatres; fewer military armories and more free forums; fewer field houses and more art galleries." Of teachers he wanted, " more than teachers of encyclopaedic data;... teachers with imagination who really enlighten students; provoke, stimulate and inspire rather than stuff, tire and bore them." While warning of the danger of dictatorship, he believed America would avoid it and said, " A strengthened democracy based on an equality of cultural opportunity will emerge from the trials and conflicts we are now undergoing." He is survived only by his widow.
